Music that night will be provided by Crandall and Sparrow -two very talented entertainers.

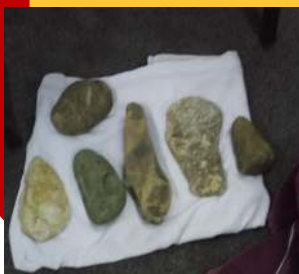


Archaeology Day 2017

Make plans to attend Archaeology Day at the museum on Saturday, September 9. An interesting morning is planned. From 10:00 until 10:30 a.m. Eastern Time, a panel discussion titled "Archaeology in Dubois County" will feature archaeologists, Dr. Rick Jones, along with local collectors, Kenny Hochgesang and Derrick Haas. From 10:30 un-

til 11:00 a.m., Derrick Haas will discuss how native peoples were able to produce stone tools and weapons from locally available resources. From 11:00 a.m. until noon, Dr. Rick Jones, Retired State Archaeologist will identify artifacts brought to the muse-

um. The public is invited to bring in arrowheads and spear points to have them identified. Kenny Hochgesang and Derrick Haas will also be present to talk to the public about artifacts. Archaeology Month pamphlets and t-shirts will be on sale.



People of the Woodlands: Native Americans in Dubois County

September is Archaeology Month. Thus would be a great time to visit the display on Archaeology at the museum.

On display at the museum is a permanent exhibit that tells about the earliest people who inhabited this area and features four displays: Prehistory, Portersville Site, Piankashaw, and Points from the Past. This display is entitled “People of the Woodlands: Native Americans in Dubois County”. You are invited to learn in the Prehistory



display the way of life of the people who lived in present-day Dubois County before the arrival of Euro-Americans. The Portersville Site tells the story of the excavations from the Glenn A. Black Laboratory of

Archaeology, Indiana University, at the site for the Portersville bridge. This display features methods used by archaeologists to discover and preserve the past. The Piankashaw display provided information on the Native American tribe that was living in this area when the first Euro-American settlers arrived. Most of our information about the Piankashaw in Dubois County comes from George R. Wilson, who wrote an early history of the county. The Piankashaw had moved into present-day Dubois County in the 1700’s and left this area by 1818. They are now living in Oklahoma where they are part of the Peoria Tribe.

Points from the Past display features artifacts found by local collectors such as Tom Fromme, Artie McBride and Kenny Hochgesang (to name a few). From the number of artifacts collect

ed locally, the prehistoric Native American population must have been considerable. The artifacts are from different time periods and reflect a variety of cultures.
