# DCM presents...Shared Heritage

We are very proud to announce that we have been successful in our quest for grant funding for our Shared Heritage Satellite Exhibit program. We have received \$10,000 from the Heritage Support Grants provided by the Indiana Historical Society and made possible by the Lilly Endowment Inc. We were also awarded a community grant from the Dubois County Community Foundation for \$20,000.

These funds will be used to develop satellite exhibits which will travel throughout the county, highlighting our shared history and love of community. As you all know, communities are held together by interpersonal relationships: friends, neighbors, family, and loved ones. Our social ties and shared experiences create cohesion, mutual understanding and fortitude. We believe that objects of material culture are the key to communicating experience from one generation to the next. Currently, our exhibit galleries present this opportunity to visitors and yet, with this satellite exhibit program, we will transcend beyond our gallery walls to share artifacts and their stories with the people who live and work in

Dubois County. Beginning in January of next year, Shared Heritage will bring curated exhibits to public facilities such as libraries, community centers, schools and senior living centers. The satellite exhibits will include audio, visual, and tactile components to aid in the interpretation of the objects.

Artifacts speak to all of us about times past. Just as your family heirlooms are cherished, cared for and treasured, so too are artifacts in the museum. Preserving these memories require a great deal of specialized care and handling. These grant funds will also allow DCM to provide special care to artifacts travelling with these exhibits.

As we develop our exhibit themes for the *Shared Heritage* program, we want to hear from you. Our initial community survey shows that exhibits relating to Foodways and Culture are crowd favorites. ### 46,000 Collection Items to Date

#### Making Connections

In July, the museum was gifted an interesting photo dated 1908. The handwriting on the back of the photo was in pencil that was faded badly, but the words, "The Country Minister" could be made out. A search of our computer records resulted in a match with a play bill for the Senior Play given by Jasper High School listing the Cast, including a description of each role and the names of the thirteen actors portraying the roles.


With the printed play bill, the names of the people written in faded pencil on the back of the photo could be made out. A check with the first Jasper High School Yearbook, The Ivy, 1913, resulted in learning that the students in the play were from the Class of 1908 that had six graduates and the Class of 1909 that had eleven graduates.

Collections is grateful to have the first JHS yearbook of 1913 that lists the graduates of JHS from 1898 until 1912, along with a brief description of their occupations in 1913. The graduates became successful citizens within a few years of their graduation from high school. It is interesting to

compare the information with a 1908 high school photo that shows them in costume and posed as the role they portrayed in the play.

Thank you to all the donors who have gifted items to the museum. We are happy to care for your items and enjoy learning more about them.

He heard many a story about the early county settlers and the past students of JHS from the two as they volunteered together. Ray, also, shared his memories of being in the service for a recent Veteran themed Festival of Trees program. Ray and Nancy have been contributors to the museum by way of Memorials given in memory of friends and family that have passed. They also donated an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) for the museum lobby and donated money for the roof replacement project. We have enjoyed Ray's stories and thank him for his hours of service to the museum.
