Here Come the Holidays

As the calendar flips to November, most thoughts turn to Thanksgiving. Well, not at the Museum. Our plans and work turns to Christmas. On Thursday, November 16 the museum will open for a FREE Admission evening from 5:30-7:30 p.m. The Festival of Trees (our annual Christmas event) will again showcase the decorating marvels of the talented community tree experts and the added creativeness of several community organizations invited to showcase their



organizations. Decorating trees again will be our fifteen Dubois County communities and those from Columbia Township. These trees will be displayed in the Mural Room.

Please join the museum on Sunday, November 12, 2023 at 1:30 pm for a hour long program to honor veterans for their service to our country.


Veterans Day originated as "Armistice Day" on November 11, 1918 to honor the end of World War I. In 1938, November 11 became a legal holiday dedicated to honoring World War I veterans. This act was later amended to include all veterans by chang-

ing the word "Armistice" with "Veterans."

Two guest speakers will be joining us to speak about their time serving our country, Christine Benitos (Office Manager at Benitos Group) will talk about her time in the military and what it was like being a woman who served. Ed Walston (professor at VUJC) will talk about his time serving in Vietnam.

ties you the opportunity to view our large military exhibit and all 50,000 square feet of exhibits at the museum. Check out a new exhibit on WWI called "A Military Christmas from WWI". Featured in the exhibit will be additional WWI items from the museum's collections and a 1918 Liberty truck lovingly restored by Robert Demuth of Ferdinand. The display will be in the Farm Equipment area.

1918 USA Liberty Truck

You want to check this out! Our Exhibit team has moved into the Farm Equipment Area a recent addition to our museum; a 1918 USA Liberty Truck. Here is a little history of this truck. After WWI the Liberty was owned by the US Army. A total of 10,000 trucks were surplused after WWI, where they were dispersed to cities and towns, and some were sold. This Liberty was one of two that the Ralph Roger's Co. owned in Bloomington. Then it moved in the 1940's to Louisville, KY to be used in Louisville Crushed Stone Quarry. It later traveled to other towns before being acquired by Francis Lindauer & Sons and then lastly purchased by Robert and Shirley Demuth of Ferdinand in 2011. The cab and chassis was restored by Lyle Dumont of Sigourney, IA.. The truck bed was built by Cornell Kemper in about the 1950's and the truck was used on the Emil Niehaus farm.



We are so blessed to have a large area to display these magnificent items.
