Highlights of Membership Dinner-Capital Expenditures and Exhibits

Work has begun on our lobby remodeling project. Check our Facebook page on any closings due to new flooring being installed.

The 2024 Edition of the Dubois County Museum Membership Dinner was held on Thursday, January 25. A total of 101 members and guests attended the evening. President Bruce Heeke called the meeting to order and welcomed all to the evening meeting and program. The theme paid tribute to our 25th Anniversary, Julia Flynn, Treasurer, reported an increase in income of almost \$200.000. Much of this increase was for specific capital expenditures and insurance settlement. In 2023 -Capital expenditures were: Room III-Dubois County Wood Furniture Industry exhibit; Painting the exterior of the building; computer and printer for collections; shelving for collections; replacement roof over two of our rental areas; New flooring was

budgeted for lobby for 2023, not spent.

Capital expenditures expected in 2024 are: Lobby and office updates with some construction, new flooring throughout, paintingsponsored, replacement roof over another section of rental area: replacement roof over lobby and office area (this will actually be paid for by insurance. Those funds were received in 2023, but the soonest we could get on the list for roof replacement was 2024; electronic key card locks; south side parking lot reseal; collection office area update.

Our Exhibits team of Cheryl Sermersheim, Rosie Stewart, Sandy Christianson and Joe Shelton (and others) had a busy 2023. They have put up

temporary exhibits, added to permanent exhibits and added brand new exhibits. There is always something new to see. Currently there are almost 9.000 items on exhibit. Here is a list of exhibits for 2023 (in not particular order): A Stitch in Time: Christmas Traditions: WWI display-A Military Christmas; Demuth Liberty Truck; Strassenfest Display; 1973 Band Reunion and exhibit: exhibit in Jasper High School entryway on Jasper and Ireland High School history; Pfaffenweiler exhibit moved and updated: updates in the school year in village; St. Paul's 175th Anniversary exhibit; Barnwood Builders came to the museum for stone carving; and additions made to Courthouse exhihit

Collections Totals

It was announced at the Membership Dinner on January 25, that Collections saw an increase of over 4,000 items entered into the collections software to bring the total to 61,500 cataloged items. This includes:

-21,000 objects of all sizes

-28,500 photographs and negatives

-7,000 archives (documents and papers)

5,000 library books, magazines and newspapers

The collection volunteers are Mary Ann Hayes, W. Jean Hoffman, Elaine Hopf, Joe Shelton, Jeff Schmitt, Nicole Lechner, Eric Russ, Mary Ellen Backer, plus others who have helped along the way.

Mrs. Hayes was involved in the organization of the county museum from its beginning and continued her involvement as a DCM Board member and officer and Chairman of the Collection Department for over twenty-five years. In her role as President of Dubois County Historical Society she also supplied extra funding to the museum with yearly memberships and room rentals for meetings, books sold in Gift Shop, as well as extra support for exhibits. It is her position as Collections Chair though that has been her most fulfilling endeavor. She educated herself in the computer system used by museums and over saw the endless updating and saving of materials, many times giving over 1,000 hours of volunteer work a year. Walk the Museum was an idea launched in January of 2021 as a way to invite people who seek a place to walk indoors during bad weather to come in and use our facility . People come in for free if they hold a yearly membership to the museum or pay \$1 if they are not a member. In 2023 the walkers came in 417 times and pur-

chased memberships that totaled \$510 a year. September and October were warm and we only saw 6 walkers. November and December saw 176 walkers alone due to the cold and wet weather. You are invited to join the group and walk during our open hours.
