

Jasper Academy graduated many community leaders before it closed in 1933. Pictures, early diplomas and class photos are on display. Jasper Academy's building was later sold to the Fathers of Divine Providence and used as the Providence Home. The structure was torn down in 1974.

Diplomas from early educational institutions at Cuzco, Birdseye, Dubois, Jasper, Ireland, Otwell, and Jefferson Township, to name a few, are displayed.

Class pictures, Reading Club pictures, and a salute to early teachers can also be found in the display.

The museum collections is missing pieces from Huntingburg and Holland. Please call the museum at 812-634-7733 if you have any pictures to add.

Also, check out the display case highlighting many early educational tools used through the years at the local schools.

The Dubois County Museum welcomes Professor Michael Strezewski, a professor of Anthropology at the University of Southern Indiana, to speak on Archaeology Day on September 13, 2025, beginning at 10:30. The program will be in the Log House area in Room 2. Professor Strezewski will share his knowledge of "The Dry Goods Store: A Bit of Civilization on Indiana's Frontier"

After his presentation local collector Derrick Haas will be on hand till noon to share his knowledge of arrowheads, spear points and tools with the audience. Haas will help you identify any of your finds.

Be sure to visit the museum's display on Archaeology and the collections of local people Tom Fromme and Artie McBride.
